# Laboratory No 1: Introduction to the Arduino Developed Board

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### Introduction

In this experiment, we will be using the Arduino Ide to compile and upload different sketches to the Arduino MEGA board. The first sequence will turn the LED, connected to pin 13, ON for 1 second and turn it OFF for the same amount of time. This delay will increment until it gets to 10 seconds then the process will restart. The second sequence will imitate the Night Rider. Finally, the first sequence will be repeated but the LED will be substituted by a 110V bulb.

## Objective

Familiarize with the basic operation and functionalities of the Arduino MEGA board and the Arduino IDE.

### Methods

### **Procedure C Language Program**

Blink:

In this experiment, we will turn an LED on for 1 second and then off for 1 second and terminate the process.

Afterwards, we will turn the LED on and off respectively for increments of 1 second until we reach a 10 second total delay. Finally, we will terminate the process.

#### Night Rider:

In this experiment we will use 5 LEDs. We will turn the first light bulb on and then off. Subsequently we do the same for the neighboring lightbulb. We do this process until we reach the end and then we wrap back around until we reach the initial LED.

#### Light Bulb:

In this experiment, we will connect an Analog light bulb to our processor and utilize the same coding process from the "Blink" experiment to turn on the light bulb.
